Dear Parents,

Within the Adventist church we have a program that is labelled S.T.O.R.M Co. The acronym for this program means Service To Others Really Matters. Teens and Youth under the direction of adult leaders visit towns in the outback. They run a kids' club for the week in the mornings until lunch and then go out in the afternoons to help the community by painting, weeding, visiting the elderly, etc.

Both of my younger girls have participated in this program as well as several other students and staff. When going out to places like Goondiwindi, etc. they go out expecting to help others and make a difference, which does happen, but always they come home feeling blessed and passionate about their own experience out there.

When serving others we feel good about what we are doing; we are engaged in life; we develop authentic, meaningful, life enhancing connections; it gives us a sense of meaning in life; and we feel we are achieving/accomplishing something. Each of these areas can be summarised as Positive Emotion, Engagement, Relationships, Meaning and Achievement – PERMA. PERMA is a well-being theory by Martin Seligman (2011). He states that in having each of the five areas flourishing within one's life creates a holistic approach to having a life well-lived. Service to others is like that. It is important that we give to others as through my own experience in doing fly 'n builds to the Solomon Islands, helping collect money for a good cause, helping as a volunteer for an event, etc. can enrich our own lives and create a joy within the heart that helps us to have a sense of belonging and a purpose in life.

Gandhi states that "the best way to find yourself is to lose yourself in the service of others." Albert Einstein agrees by pointing out "only a life lived in service to others is worth living."

Currently we are endeavouring to help students recognise that it is important to put the needs of others first and lend a helping hand. In God's word "the generous will prosper; those who refresh others will themselves be refreshed", Proverbs 11:25.

"Through love serve one another" Galatians 5:13. And finally "each of you should use whatever gift you have received to serve others as faithful stewards of God's grace in its various forms", 1Peter 4:10.


Commencing the first Friday in Term 2, Tuckshop returns! Introducing our new Tuckshop Convenor and College parent, Mrs Patricia Geelan:





With the school holidays approaching I would like to encourage you to KEEP READING and KEEP READING to your child. It's such an important part of their development as a future reader. We read to our children every night right up into their early teens and listened to audio books on our way to school and back home all the way through to Year 12. It was a great bonding experience and gave us something in common to talk about as well. Try it, you'll be surprised. As one of my favourite author's said – "You're never too old, too wacky, too wild, to pick up a book and read to a child." Dr Seuss.
