



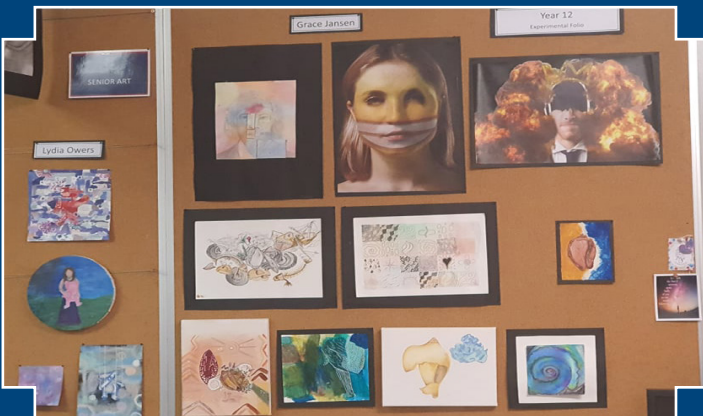

Dear Parents,

Last week we had WOW (Week of Worship) and our Open Evening. Both were very successful and celebrated both our spiritual aspect of the school and the educational experience that students have the opportunity to be a part of at NCC.

WOW saw our chapel decorated with amazing lighting and a laser light black tunnel into the chapel hall. Our theme was 'RISE' which was about reaching for more, reach for the heavens; rise up, Christians, rise up and don't be afraid to be you. Our speaker was Megan Hunter who spoke to both Primary and Secondary. Students enjoyed the focus points each day, challenges given, and the singing performed by the Chapel Bands for Secondary and Mrs Gray's group for Primary. Our Chaplains and teachers stayed back after hours to work on set props, practice music and set up the Chapel for the week. Thank you to everyone who was involved in producing a great spiritual week.

Open Evening was a hive of activity this year, and especially in Secondary. To start off the evening our Primary College Choir performed in the library, there were tours available to showcase both Primary and Secondary. I was very proud of some of the senior students who were involved in taking part in conducting tours on the night. All Primary classrooms had awesome work displayed and teachers were present to discuss their curriculum and routine within the classroom. In Secondary, there were many different displays including technology activities (robotics, VR headsets, etc.), agriculture, Passion, hands on Science, Design and Technology, and much more. Also, information sessions were held for Year 7 and Senior schooling that were well received.

Secondary teachers were also available to discuss their curriculum and routine within their subject areas. One of the highlights was at our Hospitality Kitchen where students with the amazing assistance of Miss Crawford produced delicious food ranging from stuffed garlic bread, hummus and veggie boats, savoury puff pastry triangles, pies to chocolate cake, chocolate biscuits and fruit kebabs. A big thank you to all who braved the weather and came along, and to our dedicated staff who worked throughout the day and into the evening.

We had a great response from those visiting our school for the first time on Opening Evening. We have already had enrolments for later in the year and in the next two following years. Our enrolments for the beginning of this year were 325, we have now reached 350. This is amazing growth and now some of our classes are full (Kindergarten, Year 2, Year 5 and Year 6). Next year our projected numbers are showing that we will have double streamed classes in more grade levels than this year. This is exciting news.

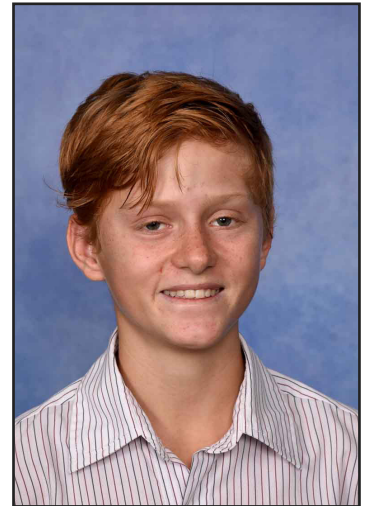

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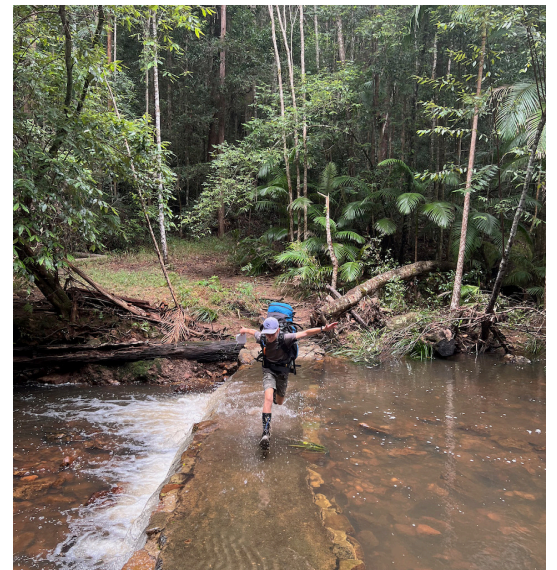
