Dear Parents,

Giving your potential purpose.

1 Corinthians 12:4-6 states, 'God gives us many kinds of special abilities, but it is the same Spirit who is the source of them all. There are different kinds of service to God, but it is the same Lord we are serving. There are many ways in which God works in our lives, but it is the same God who works in and through all of us.'

What is potential? The dictionary outlines it as an ability, aptitude, and capability available for use or development. In other words, it is the skills, talent and strengths utilised to extend one's capabilities in a focussed area.

What is purpose? It means what you intend to do; a plan or aim; determination. Many of us limit/cap our potential by not applying purpose to that potential. As we age, we may look back on missed opportunities due to not taking risks or applying our skills to new situations. Respect is not earned; it is a right that everyone deserves. So whether you're Christian or not, it is still your responsibility to uphold that right.

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


