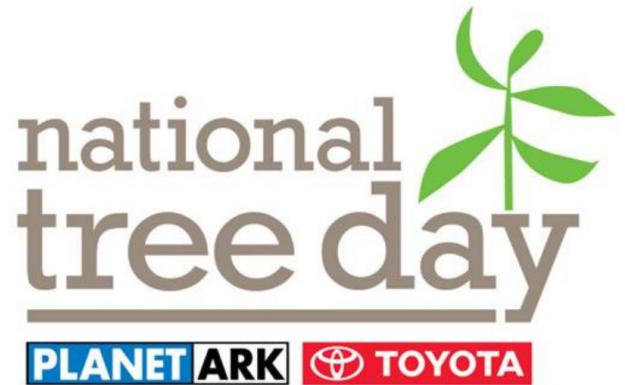

WHAT IS HAPPENING IN SECONDARY

Humanities & Social Sciences Camp

25th – 30th September 2022

The InspireU Humanities & Social Sciences Camp provides an opportunity for Year 10, 11 and 12 Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students from across the country to participate in a week-long camp that includes sessions such as communications and arts, journalism, philosophy, languages and culture, music, political science, international studies and social science.

It is a great opportunity for students to build knowledge their about university. The program exposes students to a wide range of career and study options available to Humanities and Social Sciences students and graduates.

Students are given a holistic experience of university life which is delivered in collaboration with the current Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander university students, UQ's faculties and industry partners.

Students will get to attend jammed packed engaging sessions which will include a hands on component.

All reasonable costs for the camp including all travel, flights, accommodation, meals and excursions are paid for, by the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Studies Unit (ATSISU).

Applications close: 19th August, 2022.

To be eligible to participate in the InspireU camps, applicants must:

1. Be of Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander descent
 2. Enrolled in high school at the time of application
 3. Enrolled in ATAR subjects and eligible for an ATAR score
 4. Have a school attendance rate of 90% or greater
