



Equality, inclusion and diversity underpin our Kindergarten's programs and practice. In developing our Kindergarten program our practice is founded on the belief that:

- Children are capable and competent;
- Children actively construct their own learning;
- Learning is dynamic, complex and holistic; and
- Children can initiate and lead learning and be active participants and decision makers.

An essential ingredient to this process is our physical environment and ensuring that it promotes our commitment to learning, inclusivity, independent exploration and learning through play.







Ideal Learning Environment

Noosa Christian College Cooroy is located on 11 hectares of semi-rural land offering a spacious, tranquil campus, with ample shade from the many trees left on site when the school was built.

Stimulating play equipment including obstacle courses, neat student gardens, chickens and other exciting school activities, provide plenty of opportunities for your child to learn, play and grow in the great outdoors.

The Early Years Framework

The Early Years Framework (2009) states:

Play provides a supportive environment where children can ask questions, solve problems and engage in critical thinking. Play can expand their thinking and enhance their desire to know and to learn. In these ways play promotes positive dispositions towards learning.

Our Learning – Early Years Learning Framework and Queensland Kindergarten Curriculum Guidelines

Our curriculum at Noosa Christian College, The Early Years Learning Framework and Queensland Kindergarten Curriculum Guidelines embodies our commitment to learning through play and adapting to change in our cultural climate. It's a creative, expressive and flexible design that parents/carers and teachers negotiate and implement within their own contexts.

Encompassing and supporting this curriculum guideline is the knowledge that your child's needs are met with caring, responsive and sensitive people around them. When adults act with consistency and warmth, children:

- Build a sense of security and trust;
- Develop a strong sense of themselves;
- Feel confident in communicating their moods and feelings;
- Learn to interact with others in positive ways; and
- Develop resilience and the skills to cope with conflict, challenges and new situations.



Small School Big Heart

Noosa Christian College is a small school that is big in so many ways. Most of all, your child will not be lost in the numbers. We aim for smaller class sizes with quality academic outcomes.

There is a strong sense of community within the school and our extended school family. You'll find a warm, welcoming and friendly environment at Noosa Christian College. It is a place where you will be greeted by name and your child has a valued place within our school.



Our Health – A Sustainable Lifestyle

In our kindergarten program at Noosa Christian College, our children's health, safety and environmental consciousness are noted, encouraged and endorsed with our curriculum projects. Connecting all children to their world, whilst also allowing them to contribute, enables children to have the best start in life to create a better future for themselves and the nation. At Noosa Christian College we support:

- Wrapper free lunches or 'nude' food;
- Power aware – turning off power when not needed;
- Establishing and maintaining compost areas;
- Feeding food scraps to our worm farm and our chickens;
- Maintaining our vegetable patch; and
- Working with our local Noosa Council to provide us with different bins for rubbish, paper, food scraps, plastics and cardboard.





Importance of Play

Play is more than just fun... It's how children learn and how they work out who they are, how the world works and where they fit into it.

Play is essentially a child's work and helps their brain grow while also being a lot of fun!
(Lev Vygotsky)

Block Play Encourages:

- Problem solving
- Imagination
- Self-expression
- Mathematics

Imaginary Role Play Encourages:

- Confidence building, resilience and fosters independence
- Children to navigate social terrain, language and communication
- Planning, wondering, remembering and predicting
- Children to work out who they are and what they love to do

Puzzles Encourage:

- Perseverance
- Hand-eye coordination
- Problem Solving
- A sense of achievement

Sand and Water Play Encourages:

- Body control, poise, balance and coordination
- Counting, measuring and sorting
- An understanding of cause and effect
- Exploration of colour, shape and texture in two and three dimensions



Activities

Numeracy Activities in Kindy:

Numeracy skills involve understanding numbers, counting, solving number problems, measuring, sorting, noticing patterns etc.

- Counting objects
- Pouring and measuring liquid
- Comparing different sizes
- Using words to describe where things are, e.g. over, under, next to

Literacy Activities in Kindy:

- Identifying and recognising their names
- Reading books
- Singing songs
- Finger Rhymes
- Sensory Play
- Talking
- Identifying signs
- Playdough
- Drawing and writing

Gross Motor Development:

These skills require whole body movement which involve the large core stabilising muscles of the body to perform everyday functions like skipping, climbing, standing, sitting, walking, running, catching, throwing, jumping, hopping, etc.

Fine Motor Development:

Involves the coordination of small muscles in the hands and fingers. Strong skills are essential to complete tasks like pinching, squeezing with a tweezer, picking up with a tweezer, writing, cutting, threading beads, moving puzzle pieces, zipping, buttoning etc.

Class Size and Age

Classes are restricted to 22 children. Children must turn 4 years of age by 30th June, in the year that they begin Kindergarten. To meet requirements for entry into the funded program, the Queensland Kindergarten Funding Scheme, children must be enrolled 3 days a week.

Daily Routine

A typical day in Kindergarten would include some of the following:

- Art, craft and other fine motor skills activities
- Physical education and games for gross motor development
- Rhymes, singing, poetry and music
- Movement and drama experiences
- Science and discovery experiences
- Outside play
- Free role play
- Books and stories
- Quiet time for rest, or a sleep, depending on the needs of each child

Uniform

The Kindergarten children wear the following:

- Maroon shorts (from Uniform Shop)
- NCC Kindy polo shirt (from Uniform Shop)
- College bucket hat (from Uniform Shop)
- Maroon fleecy track suit (from Store)
- Black joggers with Velcro straps (from Store)
- White socks (from Store) or sports socks (from Uniform Shop)





Kindy in Queensland

What is kindy?

Kindergarten, known as kindy, is a part-time educational program for children in the year before Prep (the first year of school in Queensland). Kindy is a place where your little one will make friends, explore new environments and have fun learning through meaningful experiences and interactions that support their early learning, wellbeing and development. By participating in kindy, children develop a love of learning and are better prepared to transition to Prep.

Queensland Government-approved kindy programs are delivered by a qualified early childhood teacher. Kindy programs can be offered at early childhood education centres, selected state schools, and by distance education or eKindy for some children who cannot access a centre.

Learning at kindy

Kindy provides young children with opportunities to learn in a respectful environment to:

- use language to communicate ideas, feelings and needs
- make friends, interact and cooperate with others
- identify issues and develop problem-solving skills
- become more confident and independent in their abilities
- connect with, explore and contribute to, their world
- build their knowledge and explore new ideas, helping to build their confidence.

KINDY counts for a lifetime.

How to enrol

In Queensland, children can attend kindy in the year before they start Prep. Each service is different and some may have a waiting list, so it's a good idea to speak to your chosen service about the best time to enrol your child.

Your child must be 4 years old by 30 June in the year they enrol to participate in kindy.

Child born	Child can attend kindy
1 July 2017 to 30 June 2018	2022
1 July 2018 to 30 June 2019	2023
1 July 2019 to 30 June 2020	2024
1 July 2020 to 30 June 2021	2025
1 July 2021 to 30 June 2022	2026

What you will need to enrol your child:

- your child's name and address
- your details as their parent, carer or guardian
- details of any court orders or parenting orders or plans
- details of any additional support required (e.g. disability, food allergies or other needs)
- proof of date of birth (e.g. birth certificate)
- health and immunisation status
- details of the people allowed to pick up your child and who to notify in an emergency.

Your service will keep this information confidential and you will have full access to your child's records.

Choosing a kindy program

The Queensland Government is committed to giving every Queensland child the opportunity for a great start to kindy, setting strong foundations for life and learning.

All children in Queensland are eligible to attend an approved kindergarten in the year before Prep.

An approved kindergarten program meets government guidelines, and is:

- a learning program delivered by qualified early childhood teachers, in accordance with government guidelines
- typically delivered for 15 hours a week, 40 weeks a year, for children in the year before Prep
- aligned with the Queensland kindergarten learning guideline or other Queensland Curriculum and Assessment Authority-accredited learning program.

To help identify a Queensland Government-approved program, look for the 'kindy tick'.

What kindy costs

Kindy fees vary depending on the service. Contact your preferred kindy for details about their fee structure.

Low or no cost kindy is provided to eligible families, including foster families, who:

- hold a current Australian Government Health Care Card (HCC) (or have a child who does)
- hold a current Australian Government Pensioner Concession Card (automatic HCC entitlements)
- hold a Department of Veterans' Affairs Gold Card or White Card
- have formal communication, such as a letter, from the relevant agency stating the intent to issue a HCC
- are Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander (or have a child who is)
- have three or more children, of the same age, enrolled in the same year.

The subsidy for low or no cost kindy is provided directly to your service provider. It may reduce your out-of-pocket expenses. It can only be claimed once, even if you meet multiple criteria.

Families of children participating in a kindy program in a long day care setting may also be eligible for the Australian Government Child Care Subsidy.

Information about eligibility for these Australian Government subsidies is available from Centrelink.

Children in foster or kinship care may also access additional subsidies. Contact your kindy service provider and then the Child Safety Service Centre for more information.




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
