### Year 9 & 10 Digital Technology

During Term 4 the Year 9 and 10 Digital Technology students dived into the world of 2D game development by coding their digital 2-player games using Pygame.

Pygame is a popular open-source library specifically designed for game development and multimedia programming in Python. It provides a set of functions and modules that allow developers to create interactive and and visually appealing games, simulations, and other graphical applications. Pygame handles various tasks, including handling graphics, audio, input devices (such as keyboards and mice), and collision detection. It is widely used for both educational purposes and professional game development projects due to its simplicity, versatility, and cross-platform compatibility.





Students over the term learned programming concepts, problem-solving, sound effects, images, moving objects, collision, and teamwork. With Pygame's tools and functions, they created engaging games, expressed their creativity, and prepared themselves for future careers in coding. Exciting times ahead!

### Year & Geography

Year 8 Geography Students Learning to Draw Maps of Megacities Based on BOLTSS

In the fascinating world of geography, understanding the complexities of urban areas is crucial. To engage students in this topic, Year 8 Geography classes embarked on an exciting journey to learn about megacities and how to represent them visually through map drawing. This endeavour is accomplished by following the BOLTSS framework, a useful mnemonic that stands for Border, Orientation, Legend, Title, Scale, and Source, which are essential elements for creating accurate and informative maps.

The first step in this process is exploring the concept of megacities. Students dive into the characteristics that define these densely populated urban areas, such as high population numbers, advanced infrastructure, significant economic influence, and cultural diversity. They study real-life examples of megacities, such as Tokyo, New York City, or Beijing, and analyse their geographical features and patterns.

Once equipped with the knowledge of megacities, the students then move on to understanding the BOLTSS framework. Each component plays a crucial role in creating clear and informative maps. The students learn that the Border outlines the boundaries of the map and helps establish scale and distance. Orientation indicates the cardinal directions, usually North, and helps viewers understand the map's placement in the world.


The Legend is a key component, as it explains the symbols and colours used on the map to represent various features such as roads, landmarks, or natural features. The Title provides a clear description of what the map represents, conveying the specific megacity being depicted. Scale helps users understand the relative size and distances within the map, while Source provides information on the data used and its credibility.

Armed with this knowledge, the students tackle the task of drawing their maps of megacities. They conduct in-depth research, gathering information on the chosen megacity's geography, landmarks, transportation systems, and any unique characteristics that define it. Using this information, they create accurate representations of the megacity, highlighting its key features and urban layout.

The map drawing process allows students to not only utilize their artistic skills but to also apply critical thinking and problem-solving abilities. They must determine the appropriate scale, choose suitable map symbols, and consider how to best represent the megacity's distinct features. It encourages creativity and attention to detail as they meticulously craft their maps.

Additionally, by drawing maps based on BOLTSS, students learn to effectively communicate geographical information. They develop skills to present maps that are informative, visually appealing, and easy for others to interpret. This exercise strengthens their spatial awareness and map reading skills, which are invaluable in numerous real-world situations.

Overall, the experience of Year 8 Geography students in learning to draw maps of megacities based on BOLTSS is an engaging and educational process. It equips them with a deeper understanding of megacities, improves their cartographic skills, and cultivates their analytical and presentation abilities. As they explore the world of geography through map drawing, these students develop a broader perspective of the world and the complex urban landscapes within it.




