TEENS & TECH

Have you ever wondered how much screen time is appropriate?

The Sydney Morning Herald ran an article last week called How Much Screen Time is Too Much? The article unpacked the data from the latest Programme for International Student Assessment concerning digital use for teenagers. The results were staggering! Students who spent more than an hour a day online for leisure (games, social media, chatting, browsing) scored up to 20 points lower in mathematics. Despite Australia's investment in educational technology (\$225+ billion per year) and being amongst the seven highest school internet users in the world, the country is still experiencing significant declines in reading performance. The article went on to say that the financial investment in educational technology had not provided any significant evidence of academic improvement and further advised that screen-based activities be minimised on school days.

In Australia, 40% of 15 year olds reported being distracted while using digital devices. This is probably what parents find the most frustrating when students are 'working' on homework. The laptop is out, the hours tick by, and very little is produced. When asked to spend less time on the device, the emotions flare and the battle becomes too hard to fight. You are not alone. The Growing Up Digital Australia study found that half of parents surveyed would welcome a partnership with schools to help children better regulate their digital habits.

In an effort to support parents in teaching healthy digital habits to our students, Brad Huddleston, a pastor and computer scientist, has been invited to share with our school community on the topic of digital addiction and restoring digital balance. Please make the effort to attend on July 17th. Registration is open now.

We have invited internationally acclaimed Christian speaker, Brad Huddleston, to address our school community about the dangers of digital technology.

Brad is a qualified computer scientist who has become aware of the dangers that technology can bring. For the last decade, Brad has researched the impact that excessive technology use can have on adolescents and how parents, in particular, are totally unaware of the dangers that this presents to their children.

His presentation will look at the physical and emotional impact that excessive technology can have on the operation of the brain, which will help many parents explain the behaviours they see in their children.

Brad will share methods and tools for restoring digital balance from a Christian perspective, as technology use has negatively impacted the spiritual tone of our homes and the spiritual growth of our children.

This is a meeting that all parents should attend, as we seek to provide a safe and secure community for the well-being of our students. This event is open to the community, so please feel free to invite your friends and family members.





YEAR 12 ENGLISH & HISTORY


Before we begin preparing for their final exams in October and November, may they all find comfort and rest during the holidays.
