PRINCIPAL'S ARTICLE CONTINUED




I simply want to offer students the opportunity to share their story and their voice. If interested, let me know.

TEENS & TECH

In September this year, the Australian Federal Government announced a social media ban for children under 16 years of age to be introduced this year. What's more, both major parties support the policy, citing major concerns about the "safety and mental and physical health of our young people." Why is the government supporting a ban rather than educating young people on how to navigate social media use?



Research shows that depression, anxiety, self-harm, and suicidal thoughts are all more common among teens who frequently use social media (Child Anxiety Counseling, 2024). Unfortunately, the recommender systems and algorithms of social media collect data and profile children's behaviour in order to introduce suggested contacts and targeted content which are often harmful, sexualised, and inappropriate. This content leads young people to compare themselves and their lives to other students and 'professionally styled, heavily filtered influencers' their wellbeing is negatively impacted. This, along with the normalisation of pornography and degrading, aggressive behaviours are the primary concerns with allowing children to access social media. As children go through puberty, their bodies and brains change. The changes in the brain during puberty make children more concerned about what their peers think, while at the same time, the impulse control part of the brain is last to develop (American Psychological Association, 2023). This makes it challenging for young people aged 10-25 years to use social media in a controlled manner.

Finding a way forward that balances the desire of young people to use social media at a time in their development when they lack the control measures to use it in small doses, makes navigating this uncharted territory very challenging. There is support on both sides of this argument with data to back the opposing views. What both sides can agree on is there is an issue with social media and it is harming our kids. Until the government finds a way to force tech companies to take responsibility for their services and products to ensure that children are not harmed while using their platforms, parents and educators have an important role to play:

- * Open communication is vitally important as one of the most harmful aspects of social media is misinformation.
- * Regularly discussing what young people see on social media will present opportunities to correct thinking, values, and behaviours.
- * Educating young people about how to navigate online platforms safely, including strong passwords, updating privacy settings regularly, reporting harmful content and experiences to authorities, and making wise choices about which media is consumed, is vitally important.

Interestingly, more schools are choosing tech-free classrooms. Sydney Grammar School in New South Wales made headlines in 2016 when laptops were banned in classes. The then Principal, John Valllance, said, "laptops were a distraction from quality teaching and the billions spent on computers in Australian schools was a scandalous waste." The school's academic ranking over the past decade has fluctuated. But since removing technology in the classrooms, the school has maintained its place in the top ten performing schools.

With more states banning mobile phones at school and more schools and universities banning laptops from classrooms, it is clear that the pendulum is swinging. How to best navigate this new terrain is still being debated as implementing change is difficult and unprecedented. What is for certain, children are being harmed; new cultural norms are negatively impacting mental wellbeing; and academics are suffering. We must be vigilant, we must push for change, and we must put the wellbeing of children ahead of incomes generated by popular platform producers and our children's' fear of missing out.
